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### VOLUNTEERING AS A FORM OF SOCIAL PROTECTION

In this article, the multifaceted role of volunteering as an active and dynamic form of social protection, the development of social stability, and the increase of community cohesion, as well as the role of volunteering in social life, are discussed.

In the United States, however, every fourth person volunteers. According to official and unofficial sources, women tend to be more voluntary than men. Especially after the coronavirus pandemic, the voluntary system changed. Between 2020 and 2022, when the pandemic began, the percentage of online volunteering increased from 32% to 51%.

In recent years, such terms as voluntary and voluntary activities have been common in our language and literature. Dictionaries were referred to to explain the answer to this question correctly. Volontyor (fr. volontaire) — dobrovolets; litso, dobrovolno postupivshee on voennuyu slujbu) means.<sup>2</sup>

Volontyor is a natural person who performs voluntary work. Voluntary activities are carried out by citizens, their groups, or voluntary organizations for the benefit of individuals, both physically and physically. Voluntary activities are voluntary activities that are carried out free of charge for the benefit of individuals, both physically and physically, performed at will, needyly directed, and beneficial to the congregation. 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The word "volunteer" is derived from French and dates back to the 17th century. The active use of the word in practice became popular in the 18th century, when people began volunteering to join the military. To date, the word "volunteer" is related, not to military service, but to more congregation activities.<sup>4</sup> Since the 19th century, organized volunteer movements have been organized for young people and women to carry out activities such as helping soldiers wounded in wars, collecting food and clothing for them.<sup>5</sup>

During World War II, volunteers also began to travel to various foreign countries to help others. Later, as volunteerism became popular, various organizations, educational institutions began to demand that their employees and students participate in voluntary programs. Voluntary work is also now taken into account when submitting documents to various educational programs.

The following countries have the largest number of voluntary countries: the USA, New Zealand, Norway, Canada and Australia. In these countries, volunteers also participate in situations caused by climate problems, such as volunteering to teach others their skills and knowledge. They also participate in international voluntary projects.
